Allan Fisher (BM 1983) is teaching public school in New York City. James Umble (MM 1984) enjoyed a one-year residency in the DMA program at the University of Michigan before returning to his teaching position at Youngstown State University. Tracy (Bowerman) Phillips (BM 1981) is teaching elementary music in the Eaton School System near Oxford, OH. Marty Spitzer (BM 1981) lead his Bellbrook marching band in the 1993 Liberty Bowl Parade. Craig

Young (BM 1989) is pursuing a master's degree at Ohio State University. Amanda Blevins (BM 1993) is working at Coyle Music and developing a private studio in Columbus. James Martini (MM 1993) has accepted a high school band position in East Stroudsburg, PA. Shannon Ford teaches a large private saxophone/clarinet studio in Toledo. She continues her activities with Sax 4th Avenue Saxophone Ouartet which includes alumni Kevin Heidbreder (MM 1985), Stanley George (BM 1989) and Jason Yost (BM 1993). Yost has recently started his masters at BGSU and continues his band teaching position at St. Johns High School. Sarai Hedges (MB 1993) is teaching business at BGSU.

NEWS FROM HOME AND ABROAD

Saxophonist/music history/ethnomusicology major EDWARD WALLACE is pursuing a second year of studies in China as funded through grants from the **BGSU** Asian Studies Committee and the BGSU Committee for International Education. Concerning his experiences, he writes, "I am currently studying Chinese language and martial arts at Shandong University; however my major focus is on independent study of Chinese music. My study of Chinese music is both broad and specific. I am working on gaining a decent knowledge of traditional Chinese instruments and art forms such as Beijing Opera, while at the same time focusing on specific research topics such as festival percussion music and the musics of different minority nationalities of China. My role in China has not been one of performer. However, currently I am in the process of forming a foreign students' ensemble with a new Hungarian student who is on sabbatical from teaching at a music academy in Hungary - her specialty is medieval music. I am introducing her to the works of Ryo Noda. This should be interesting."

Fulbright Scholar DAVID RICE is completing a year of study in Bordeaux, France working with world-renowned teacher/artist Jean-Marie Londeix. Since Londeix will retire at the end of 1994, this is truly a unique opportunity. David writes: "I had my technique exam about a week ago and I placed 4th in Londeix's

class. We had to prepare all majors and minors in regular scales, thirds, fourths—three times in one breath with 16 different articulations...Presently, I am preparing for my concert in Berlin, playing Le Frene Egare by Francois Rosse. I practice 5-8 hours per day! My lessons are on Wednesdays. From 1:30-3:00 is the "superior class" (playing with piano in front of other students) and at 3:00-7:00 I have a class lesson with three other people (an American, a German and a French student). In addition, I perform in a saxophone quartet and am playing tenor in Londeix's saxophone ensemble."

Our BGSU saxophone studio experience has been enhanced by the presence of foreign students Marco Albonetti and Yiannis Miralis (see photo). Both currently play in the Transcontinental Saxophone Quartet where they have been instrumental in organizing European summer quartet concerts in Italy and Cyprus. MARCO ALBONETTI, who is pursuing a one-year BGSU performance certificate, comes from Faenza, Italy, and he studied at the Conservatory G. Rossini in Pesaro. He has won honors in at least nine national and international competitions in Italy and has performed many prestigious concerts, including a special tour of South Africa and a recital at the Ravenna Festival in Saltzburg. Marco is the first Italian musician to study classical saxophone in the USA! YIANNIS MIRALIS is a native of Nicosia, Cyprus. He holds degrees from the Pedagogical Academy and the Greek Conservatory in Nicosia. Besides serving as saxophonist (and violinist) in the National Guard of Cyprus, Miralis has presented performances in Germany and England. The recipient of a Fulbright Scholarship, he completed a bachelor of music degree from Lawrence University in 1993 and is presently continuing his education at BGSU as a graduate assistant in music education.

JAMES UMBLE - ALUMNI FOCUS

BGSU Alumni James Umble (MM 1984) is currently assistant professor of saxophone at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University, a position which he has held since 1984. Nationally active as a soloist and clinician, Umble has recently released a compact disc entitled *Dejeuner sur l'herbe* which has been nominated for a Grammy award and is regularly aired on radio stations throughout the state.


Mr. Umble began his musical studies at Susquehanna University where he earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree. Following graduation, he travelled to Bordeaux, France and studied with the reknowned saxophonist Jean-Marie Londeix. Jim ultimately received the prestigious Medialle d'orr (Gold Medal) in music performance for his work at the Bordeaux Conservatory. Upon returning to the USA, he taught high school band for three years, then

pursued his masters degree at BGSU, serving as graduate assistant for John Sampen. He is now completing a doctorate from the University of Michigan under saxophonist Donald Sinta.

Jim's performing and research activities include the 1988 premiere of Paul Turok's Improvisations at the 1988 World Saxophone Congress in Tokyo. Umble also toured Japan with Londeix and the International Saxophone Ensemble of Bordeaux. In February of 1994, he premiered Marilyn Shrude's new Concerto for Saxophone with the Youngstown State University Wind Ensemble as part of the Dana School's 125th Anniversary Celebration. Last month Mr. Umble soloed with the Youngstown Symphony, premiering a new concerto by Dave Rivello and performing Fantasia by Villa Lobos.

Jim's scholarly research has lead him back to Bordeaux to pursue a book on The Life and Pedagogy of Jean-Marie Londeix. He has presented excerpts of this study at the regional NASA convention in Manitoba, Canada last February with Londeix in attendance. In addition, he has conducted personal research on MIDI instruments and computer applications and is organizing a MIDI studio at Youngstown State University.

CURRENT EVENTS

Our outstanding 1993/94 saxophone class was comprised of twenty undergraduate students and five graduate candidates hailing from the states of Massachusetts, Florida, Illinois, Michigan, Georgia, New York, Ohio, Italy and Cyprus. Seniors who will graduate in August or December of 1994 include David Laub, Amanda Materne, Kristy Weyand and Chris Corde. Chamber music was a big focus this year with three traditional SATB quartets, our enlarged saxophone choir (featuring a brand-new Selmer bass saxophone!) and a first-time jazz saxophone quartet coached by grad-assistant Russ Peterson. Our in-coming freshman class for 1994/95 should be very strong. I was overwhelmed but pleasantly excited about the volume of talented prospective freshman.

Sax 4th Avenue Quartet continues a "loose" association with BGSU (Jason Yost is working nights on a master's degree and Shannon Ford is "almost" finished with her document). This popular group has been honored with a special featured performance at the April National MENC meeting in Cincinnati. Black Swamp Quartet has reorganized in Columbus and has pursued an active schedule of concerts and clinics, including a featured program at the prestigious Phillips Collection in Washington D.C., a one-month tour in Florida over Christmas and an October alumni recital in BGSU's new art gallery.

We are proud to recognize two 1993/
94 BGSU concerto winners (out of three winners for the entire college) – graduate student Kirk O'Riordan (Ibert Concertino da Camera) and senior Amanda Materne (Dubois Concerto). We also have just learned that Megan Compton received the Freshman Out-

standing Bandswoman Award, and the Transcontinental Saxophone Quartet (Russell Peterson, Marco Albonetti, Amanda Materne, Yiannis Miralis) is a semi-finalist in the National Fischoff Competition. They will compete for top honors during mid-April in South Bend. Besides a heavy spring calendar of public school concerts, the quartet will tour Europe this summer with at least six scheduled recitals in Italy and Cyprus.

Special visiting guests to our campus included Ryo Noda (composer/ saxophonist from Osaka, Japan), Allen Rippe (professor from Memphis State) and Steve Jordheim (professor from Lawrence University).

Associate Dean Richard Kennell has been conducting research with participation from our saxophone studio, video taping selected students for "problem solving" analysis. Dr. Kennell has already published extensively on the phenomena of studio teaching – watch for forthcoming articles and publications.

Saxophone social events included a one-day ski trip to Mt. Brighton (see ski photo). Along with the usual weekend parties at Amanda's and Chris Corde's apartments, we also enjoyed weekly basketball games (7:30 a.m. on Tuesdays) with a few "hardy" saxophone majors and other music graduate students. We are also hoping to schedule a "broom hockey" game this spring and/or soccer with our international students. Some of our athletic graduate candidates continue their "whiffle ball" games in the courtyard during practice breaks (and sometimes instead of practicing).
