

ALUMNI QUARTETS "Continuing the Tradition"

Many alumni have found professional fulfillment through participation in saxophone quartets throughout the USA. Here are a few current groups that successfully carry on the BGSU chamber music tradition.

Black Swamp Saxophone Quartet (Brian Thomas, 1987 MM; Wesley Miller, 1989 BM; Jay Miglia, parttime BGSU jazz instructor) is reorganizing but carries on a distinguished tradition which includes 1st prize at the International Fischoff Competition (1992). Based in Columbus, OH, the quartet has traveled to Switzerland (1995 and 1996) to co-sponsor a saxophone camp with Matthias Gubler (1988 MC).

The Chromos (or Enigma) Quartet (Susan Cook, 1992 BM) just released their new compact disc "Winds" featuring music of Luke Marcel. They also have recorded "XAS" by Xenakis (available on the Mode label No. 56).


The Cincinnati Quartet (Kevin Towner, 1996 BM) is a new group which actively presents jazz and classical concerts in southern Ohio.

Sax 4th Avenue (Stan George 1989 BM; Shannon Ford, 1995 MM; Kevin Heidbreder, 1985 MM; Jason Yost, 1993 BM) is perhaps the "premiere" quartet in northwest Ohio. This highly-active ensemble performed at the 1996 Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago and the 1997 OMEA convention in Toledo. They have recorded a compact disc for release in late summer.

The Transcontinental Quartet (Russell Peterson, 1997 MM; Marco Albonetti, 1996 MM; Amanda Materne, 1994 BM; Yiannis Miralis, 1995 MM) continues to function in summer months, focusing on European tours including a featured 1996 concert at the famous Italian Ravenna Festival. The ensemble has recently commissioned David Maslanka for a new quartet to be premiered in 1997.

The Vision Quartet (Dennis Lindsay, 1989 BM) is active in the Chicago area. Last February the group released "Conicality," a compact disc which includes Rob Steel's saxophone quartet (1989 BM). In late May they presented a performance of Marilyn Shrude's "Evolution V" with soloist Susan Cook (1992 BM).





Saxophonist makes big bucks serenading cows!

German musician Franz Braun has never played his oversized sax at Carnegie Hall, but he's made a small fortune criss-crossing America — serenading cows and chickens.

"Many of the contented cows and chickens in this country are that way because of Franz' sweet soothing pasture music," said one Wisconsin farmer with a huge dairy herd.

"My cows have given a better grade of milk and more of it since I hired Franz to play magical music with his custom-made sax six years ago."

A respected concert musician in his native Germany, Franz came to America 10 years ago to make his mark in the concert music world. But his plans took a weird twist

six years ago when he visited a dairy farmer near Madison, Wis.

"I was outside on a sunshiny day rehearsing my baritone sax when I noticed my friend's dairy herd was standing by the fence behind me. They seemed to be mesmerized by my music.

"For more than an hour, my audience was a herd of contented cows. They didn't leave until I finished playing. I learned later that the herd produced a record amount of higher quality milk in the week that followed."

Word of mouth among dairy farmers has made Franz a rich man since that day. He travels

America's heartland, soothing cows with popular ballads and classical music. Recently, he realized his music has the same relaxing effect on chickens.

"I have booked four chicken concerts a month for the next year, in addition to my dairy work," Franz told a reporter. "Poultry farmers say their hens lay more and larger eggs after listening to my music."

America's hog farmers have offered Franz big money to play pretty music for their pigs, "but I simply don't have the time," he said.

THE MOO-SIC MAN!

The preceding article and photo appeared in *Weekly World News* on September 24, 1996.

Upon first glance, this is an interesting if somewhat bazaar story which suggests new careers for enterprising saxophonists. In carefully reading the article, however, certain inaccuracies become obvious. For example, "...rehearsing my baritone saxophone..." is stated when actually the photo refers to a contrabass saxophone. Or "...makes big bucks serenading cows..." seems unlikely, especially since I have never met a musician aware of this "golden op-

portunity." Most revealing, however, was the photograph itself. The picture strongly resembled my Belgian friend, Mr. Freddy Vanattenhoven. I sent him the article and he reported that the photo was indeed a picture of himself as printed in a Flemish magazine in 1975. (Freddy sent me a copy of the original story from Belgium). He writes that "The combination contrabass-sax and cows was made by the photographer as a joke for his readership, most of which were not musicians. In that period [of time] we gave lots of concerts in Belgium, Germany and France with the Belgian Saxophone Septet of Francois Daneels. The contrabass-sax always was the eye-catcher on the concert, if I played it or not. In any case, if I made a lot of money blowing for the cows, I would like to see that money and I will give you part of it." Apparently the article is entirely fiction. If there is a German named Franz Braun, this photo is certainly not his picture and if anyone made money "blowing for the cows" it was not Freddy. The moral of this story—beware of the tabloids.
