# BOHICA QUARTET WINS THE COLEMAN AND MTNA

Congratulations to our own Bohica Saxophone Quartet which captured first prize at the Coleman Awards last May in Pasadena, Calif. Performing music of Xenakis, Del Borgo, Pierne and Florio, the quartet was in competition with saxophone groups from Northwestern, Arizona State and the University of Michigan. This is the second consecutive year that a BGSU saxophone quartet received top honors at the Coleman—our 5th Generation Quartet won in 2001.

Bohica also won first prize at the Music Teachers National Association National Collegiate Chamber Music competition last March. The ensemble had previously won the state and regional levels, and competed for top honors in Cincinnati during the MTNA national convention.

Members of the Bohica Saxophone Quartet were all graduate students and included Michael Ibrahim, soprano (Calgary, Alberta), Jim Flowers, alto (Hermitage, Pa.), Jeff Price, tenor (Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio) and Lee Michael Morrison, baritone (Miami, Fla.).

# **CURRENT EVENTS**



There are the occasional brave saxophonists who need physical activity and join our 8 a.m. basketball games (especially Ku, Wu and Paul Shevock) and our studio certainly enjoyed its usual fall and spring parties, this year featuring ultimate frisbee and softball.

enjoyed special trips throughout the year, including an outing of at least 15 students and alumni who gathered in Denton, Texas, for the 2002 North American Saxophone Alliance Biennial. Several people attended Marco Albonetti's "Faenza Estate Workshop" in Italy last summer and at least six current or former students flew to Dinant, Belgium, to compete in the International Adolphe Sax Competition in September.

We graduated 11 saxophone students—a big loss to our program. Nearly all of these new alumni are now teaching or pursuing advanced graduate degrees. However, the tradition continues and we have welcomed an outstanding 2002/2003 saxophone class featuring 27 students (eight master's candidates and 19 undergraduates). The studio members hail from the countries of Canada and Taiwan and from the states of Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Wisconsin. Shannon Ford (1995 MM) is assisting me this year as a part-time instructor working with four of our five saxophone quartets.

Special recent guest artists to campus included Marcus Weiss (Switzerland), Cliff Leamann (South Carolina) and jazz saxophonist Richie Cole (New York).
