BGSU alumni Stanley George, Shannon Ford, Kevin Heidbreder and Jason Yost are now in their second year as members of Sax 4th Avenue.... an outstanding saxophone quartet dedicated to education and virtuosic performance. Special performing highlights from their 1992/93 season include featured quartet concerts at Indiana State University, Interlochen Arts Camp and the BGSU New Music and Art Festival. They also recently performed for a "standing room only" audience (including many BGSU alumni) at the 1993 OMEA convention in Cincinnati.

The ensemble presents all styles of music, including original commissions and new arrangements. They have been particularly recognized for their choreography ("a la Canadian Brass") and humorous presentations—their most "outrageous realization" features the William Tell Overture). A popular and active quartet, they continually delight audiences at

CURRENT EVENTS

During the 1992/93 academic year, our talented saxophone class consisted of seventeen undergraduates and five graduate students. Besides the traditional lessons and master classes, the saxophone chamber music program involved four SATB quartets and a resurrected saxophone choir; these groups performed at least twenty concerts throughout the states of Ohio, Indiana and New York. As we look forward to next season, our anticipated freshman class includes a stellar group of ten gifted saxophonists from Massachusetts, Florida, Illinois, Michigan, Georgia and Ohio.

Musical highlights for the year include an exciting trip to Italy for the 10th World Saxophone Congress (Dr. Sampen and six students). Christopher Corde was named concerto winner (one of only three) and soloed with the Bowling Green Philharmonia (Creston Concerto). The Black Swamp Saxophone Quartet and Sax 4th Avenue Quartet both presented important recitals in Cincinnati. Sophomore Demmy Steinmetz and junior David Laub won positions in

performing groups for Cedar Point this summer; be sure to look for them in "Rock 'N Roll Fever" or "The Rockers."

Other studio honors went to Andy Buskey, who was finalist for a national anthem composition contest. John Kurokawa was winner of the Lima Symphony Concertos (on clarinet) and was named SAI "Man of the Year." Ed Wallace has spent the 1992/93 school year studying at Shan dong University in China on a grant from the BGSU International Committee. David Rice has just won a Fulbright Scholarship for studies with Jean-Marie Londeix in France next year. David joins three previous saxophone alumni in winning this prestigious award (Christopher Ford, Joseph Murphy and Elizabeth Shirk). Kirk O'Riordan was 2nd prize winner of the Agnes Fowler Ohio Federation of Music Clubs. And three saxophone students won Outstanding Bandsman/Bandswomen awards (Amanda Materne, Darin Jesse and Christopher Corde).

As a saxophone class, we enjoyed

guest residencies by Eric Finney (saxophonist from Minnesota), Claude Delangle (Saxophone Professor of the Paris Conservatory) and Swiss saxophonist, Matthias Gubler. Dennis Sichner and Greg Ruffer returned to campus as special alumni speakers and provided fascinating perspectives on career and job opportunities. Several students joined in the Earth Day Celebration through a concert of music dedicated to birds. We also experimented with various saxophone/art collaborations and enjoyed tours of the new BGSU art galleries. And, of course, the saxophone studio participated in its usual round of "saxophone bonding" through a series of parties (frequently hosted by senior Amanda Materne).

10th WORLD SAXOPHONE CONGRESS PESARO, ITALY

On September 3-7, 1992, John Sampen, Marilyn Shrude and six advanced BGSU saxophone students were participants at the 10th World Saxophone Congress (Festival Mondiale del Sassofono) in Pesaro, Italy. Held in different world locations every four years, this event is the most prestigious gathering of international concert and jazz saxophonists. In attendance were nearly 1000 artists, composers and enthusiasts from at least twenty countries. The five-day festival featured concerts, masterclasses, equipment displays, demonstrations and meetings. For these world conventions, one important focus is the performance of new compositions for the instrument. Nearly 95 works received world premieres and many other late 20th Century compositions were presented, offering an important crosssection of new music activity from all over the world.

Most of the concert activities were held in the Teatro G. Rossini, a beautiful 19th century hall seating approximately 1000 people. The performance on September 4th featured world premieres of new music by Dr. Shrude (And They Shall Inherit...) and by the late internationlly-recognized composer John Cage (Four 5). Performing in a saxophone ensemble with Dr. Sampen were graduate students Shannon Ford, Sarai Hedges, Kirk O'Riordan and undergraduate students Susan Cook, Amanda Materne and David Rice. The concert attracted considerable attention, including local TV cameras and a full house.

Marilyn Shrude conducted both performances.

Dr. Sampen additionally presented a concerto with the Orchestra Internazionale D'Italia on September 6th (Sampen was one of only four orchestral soloists from the USA). Assisted by BGSU electronic engineer Mark Bunce, he played Morton Subotnick's In Two Worlds for alto saxophone, computer and orchestra, a work which he commissioned with help from the NEA in 1984. Again, the hall was sold out and the performance was well received.

Other Congress activities included a performance by alumni Dennis

Lindsay (with Dr. Shrude), playing a composition by alumni composer/saxophonist Robert Steel. Steel also composed a new work premiered by the Vision Saxophone Quartet of Chicago. Graduating senior, Susan Cook commissioned and premiered a solo saxophone composition by alumni composer Evan Chambers (who is the new faculty composer at University of Michigan).

These various presentations helped establish the name of Bowling Green State University as a major center for composition, technology and saxophone performance, and instruction.
