

Since 1996, BGSU has enjoyed the residence and talents of five Taiwanese saxophonists. Each continues to pursue different stages of career development, but all are making important cultural statements. They will most certainly be responsible for shaping the future of the concert saxophone in Taiwan.

During August of 2001, Shyen Lee and Chia-Hsiu Tsai organized a saxophone camp in Taipei for more than 50 Taiwanese students. The setting presented a perfect opportunity for a Taiwanese reunion. Chia-Hsiu ("Kenny") Tsai (1998 MC & 2000 MM), and Shyen Lee (1998 MM) are pursuing profes-

sional teaching careers in Taipei. Cheng-Yu "Jimmy" Lee (2001 MC) is a current master's candidate at the University of North Texas. Po-Yuan Ku (1999 MC) is completing his master's degree at BGSU and Chih-Huan Wu is a certificate student at BGSU.



CURRENT EVENTS

BGSU saxophone ensembles performed at least sixteen concerts in fall semester alone, including a live broadcast for Toledo morning television, a "Saxophobia" young audience presentation, various party receptions, and guest concerts in nearby public schools and colleges. Many in the saxophone studio also traveled to Dayton, Ohio in February as participants in the Regional North American Saxophone Alliance meeting. There were also trips overseas, including our four students who traveled to Italy for the Florence workshop. Additionally, Kelli Pence and Greg Cornelius spent time in France and Germany, Eva Egolf participated in a workshop in Bali, Carey Valente and Erik Rönmark visited France and Sweden, and Ku and Jimmy Lee returned to Taiwan.

Special campus guests included Claude Delangle (Paris Conservatory), Frank Bongiorno (UNC-Wilmington) and Jean-Michel Goury (CNR de Boulogne Billancourt).

There were, of course, the spirited saxophone parties such as our croquet outing at Rachel Clark's house. We continued morning basketball activities as well as informal student meetings on the third floor around the mushroom couch, often with Steve Leffue sound asleep following his all-night practice sessions. Steve officially graduated in the summer of 2001 and is planning to live in Amsterdam where he will study with Arno Bornkamp. Other recent graduates include Cheng-Yu Lee (Jimmy) who finished the certificate program and is pursuing a master's degree at University of North Texas. Erik Rönmark completed his masters and has moved to Ann Arbor as a doctoral assistant with Donald Sinta. Kelli Pence and Jessica Maxfield finished their degrees and are now graduate candidates at Northwestern where they study with Fred Hemke. And finally David Born joined the employed ranks with his new teaching position

As already mentioned, our 2001/2002 class has been nobly led by Marco Albonetti and Shannon Ford while Sampen completes his leave of absence. The studio itself is one of largest ever with eight new freshmen and eight graduate/ music certificate students for a total of thirty-one saxophonists. They hail from the states of Illinois, Michigan, Georgia, Florida, Pennsylvania, Nebraska, Tennessee, Missouri, Virginia, Ohio, and the countries of Canada and Taiwan.


