WORLD SAXOPHONE CONGRESS 13 MINNEAPOLIS • JULY 9-13, 2003

Bowling Green State University made an impressive showing as 30 BGSU faculty, alumni and students converged on Minneapolis and the 13th World Saxophone Congress from July 9-13, 2003. The Congress, which convenes every three years, drew many of the world's finest saxophonists, as well as an audience of 1,800 people for performances, master classes, lectures and demonstrations. BGSU alumni and student representatives traveled to Minnesota from Taiwan, Cyprus and Canada, and the states of Arizona, Michigan, Texas, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Illinois, Arkansas, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Ohio.

John Sampen was one of the featured evening soloists as he presented the American premiere of Dr. Marilyn Shrude's *Memories of a Place* for saxophone and string orchestra. Also honored with an evening performance, the Transcontinental Saxophone Quartet with Russell Peterson (1995 MM), Yiannis Miarlis (1995 MM) and Scotty Stepp (1999 MM) performed David Stock's *Concerto* for saxophone quartet and wind symphony. World premieres were played by James Umble (1984 MM) and Carey Valente (2002 BM). In addition, James Flowers (2003 MM) performed the world premiere of *Prediction* by alumni composer Matt Brazofsky.

Former BGSU saxophone professor Lou Marini Sr. received special recognition on October 10th and 11th as he returned to the Bowling Green campus for homecoming festivities. Marini was professor of saxophone and assistant director of bands at BGSU from 1964-1977. Marini currently resides in Arapahoe, North Carolina, where he is an active arranger, performer and golfer.

During the homecoming weekend, several of his band arrangements were presented in concert by the BGSU Wind Ensemble and

CURRENT EVENTS

It was another terrific year for the saxophone studio as we graduated five students (Eva Egolf, Greg Cornelius, James Flowers, Michael Ibrahim and Lee Morrison) and watched Kollister Williams creep closer to his collegiate "finale" (hopefully only one more year to go). For the fall 2003 semester, we welcomed three new freshmen, a graduate student and one music certificate candidate for a total of 25. Current saxophonists hail from the countries of Canada and Taiwan and from the states of Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Arizona and Virginia.

Our five student quartets performed at least 25 concerts on and off campus, plus a featured performance (one of six collegiate quartets) at the U.S. Navy Band's 26th International Saxophone Symposium in Fairfax, Va. On-campus guest saxophone clinicians included Joseph Murphy (Mansfield University) and Paul Cohen (Oberlin Conservatory).

Nearly one-third of our student saxophonists performed and studied abroad during the past summer. Erin Rogers worked in Paris and Chih-Huan Wu presented concerts in Taiwan. Justin Church, Kim Gedde, Michael Holmes and Katie Schuh participated in the Italian Riva del Garda workshop, while Allison Balcetis and Chris Chmielewski attended the Faenza Estate Workshop in Italy.

And—our studio enjoyed various social functions, often at the infamous Lee Morrison house. These special activities included saxophone Christmas caroling, a Halloween costume party, ultimate frisbee and basketball.
