
APPLAUSE FOR OUR DMA STUDENTS

LONDEIX COMPETITION & THAILAND by Noa Even


In July of 2011, I participated in the 3rd Jean-Marie Londeix International Saxophone Competition on the beautiful campus of Mahidol University just outside Bangkok, Thailand. The jury included saxophonists Jean-Marie Londeix, Lars Mlekusch, Daniel Kientzy, Debra Richtmeyer, Arno Bornkamp, and composer Narong Prangcharoen. Overall, the competition was a wonderful opportunity to hear high-level saxophone playing from all over the world. I had a great time meeting musicians from Japan, Taiwan, Australia, Austria, Spain, France, Thailand, and elsewhere. After preparing for the competition for a full year, I was delighted and honored to advance through all three rounds and to receive the third prize. After the competition, all competitors received valuable feedback from the judges about our performances.

Following the competition, I performed and conducted workshops for young saxophonists in Songhkla, Thailand and Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia with Phil Pierick, my saxophone duo partner. We concluded the tour in Singapore with performances at the First Singapore Saxophone Symposium. Phil and I formed Ogni Suono Saxophone Duo in 2010 and had commissioned and premiered many new works that were included on our program. I was surprised and encouraged by the excitement of the Asian students who were so receptive to new music.

Noa Even is a second year DMA student at BGSU. She also holds degrees from the University of Illinois and Northwestern University.



STOCKHAUSEN COURSES & CONCERTS by James Fusik



In early August 2011 I had the pleasure of attending the annual Stockhausen Courses and Concerts in Kürten, Germany. This nine-day gathering was a time where instrumentalists, musicologists, composers, dancers, and sound engineers could deeply interact with and learn about the works of the late composer from his closest collaborators. Each day was filled with lectures, master classes, free time for study of the Stockhausen-Verlag collection, and every evening there were culminating night concerts featuring all Stockhausen programs. As the only saxophonist this particular year, I split time in master class coachings with both clarinetist Suzanne Stephens (In Freundschaft) and flutist Kathinka Pasveer (Edentia). These two artists are world famous for their performances of Stockhausen's music.

One of my great pleasures from the workshop was my recognition as performer of *Edentia* on the participants' public concerts. In this rural area, it was remarkable to see a full audience of 300 people attending the new music concerts every night. At the close of the week, the Stockhausen Foundation

awarded prizes for the performers, and I shared 1st prize for my interpretation of *Edentia*. This was a nice personal bonus, since my goal for the trip was primarily focused on education and research.

The organizers of the festival and my host family were warm, gracious, and eager to have the participants and myself return in the future. Both Suzanne and Kathinka remembered Dr. Sampen and Dr. Shrude and praised their teaching and artistry. For me, the Stockhausen workshop was a temporary immersion into another artistic world, and it has absolutely increased my knowledge of and connection to the music of this major icon of postwar music. I close with a quote from Kathinka after my performance of *Edentia*: "Stockhausen loved the saxophone, and especially its versatility. Spread his music to all your students."



CURRENT EVENTS

Among our many studio highlights this year was the production and performance of "La bocca, I piedi, il suono" by Salvatore Sciarrino. Performed on the 32nd Annual BGSU New Music Festival, Sciarrino's work required the forces of a solo saxophone quartet and 100 assisting saxophonists. Alumni, students and guests joined forces to perform a spectral flash mob at the BGSU Union plus a full forty-five minute concert production in Kobacker Hall.

Our students were particularly active last season in various national and international trips. Nine BGSU saxophonists traveled with Sampen/Shrude to Italy last summer for a study abroad program entitled "Music and Art in Florence." In the fall of 2010, six of our graduate students were hired for an outdoor Detroit film production of Matthew Barney's "Ancient Evenings." Five BGSU saxophone quartets have performed regularly at regional sites and also enjoyed tours to the East and West coasts. Additionally, many






members of the class participated in a variety of other important workshops, competitions and conventions.
