

Other personal highlights from the past season include our Sampen/ Shrude concert tour in Minnesota. our numerous BGSU student and faculty performances at the North American Saxophone Alliance convention (Northwestern University), and the many, many student awards accumulated by our talented 1997/ 98 saxophone class (see "Current Events").

INTERNATIONAL FIRSTS

Three international students and alumni are setting records as they finish collegiate degrees at Bowling Green State University. To the best of our knowledge, these individuals represent the very first concert saxophonists from their respective countries to complete musical studies at an American university!

Alumni Marco Albonetti (Faenza, Italy) completed the Music Certificate Program (1995) and graduated from BGSU with a master's degree in saxophone performance (1997). A founding member of the Transcontinental Saxophone Quartet, Marco is continuing his performing and education as a doctoral candidate at Michigan State University (another first for an Italian saxophonist). He was recently awarded a teaching position at the Bari Conservatory in Italy.

Graduate student Shyen Lee (Taipai, Taiwan) will conclude his BGSU graduate performance studies in August of this year. Shyen holds an undergraduate degree from the New England Conservatory. He has been active as a soloist and chamber musician in commissioning and performing new music. Shyen has recently been invited to interview for important teaching positions at several conservatories in Taiwan.

Undergraduate saxophonist Oz Koren (Ariel, Israel) will finish his performance degree in December of 1998. An honors student and winner of an American/Israel Cultural Foundation Scholarship, Oz is also pursuing a conducting degree and has won a conducting fellowship for summer studies in South Carolina. After graduation, he plans to pursue a master's degree in the USA.

BGSU "BERNARD RANDS" SAXOPHONE COMMISSIONING PROJECT

We are proud to announce a special saxophone commissioning project offered exclusively for BGSU saxophone students and alumni. Pultizer Prize winner Bernard Rands has agreed to compose a solo saxophone work especially for us! His new virtuosic music will be entitled MEMO 6 and represents an addition to his current MEMO series of solo compositions. Its completion in 1999 will coincide with the composer's 65th birthday.


All current and former BGSU saxophone students are invited to participate but enrollment is limited. Cost will be \$125 per saxophonist. As a member of this consortium, each participant will receive a signed

performance score, will have his/her name inscribed on the score as part of the consortium and will have the opportunity to "premiere" the composition on November 7, 1999. We will hopefully present multiple premiere performances all over the world at the same time!

Bernard Rands is considered one of the world's most renowned composers. He is acclaimed as a major figure in contemporary music with more than 90 works, including large choral and symphonic compositions, chamber music, music theatre and instrumental solos. Among Rands' recent commissions are works for the New York Philharmonic's 100th anniversary; the centenary of

Carnegie Hall; and a cello concerto for the Boston Symphony and cellist Mstislav Rostropovich. In addition to the 1984 Pulitzer Prize, he has been honored with a Friedheim award; major prizes from the American Academy of Arts and Letters; awards from the Guggenheim, Fromm and Koussevitzky Foundations and many others. He is a former student of Dallapiccola, Bruno Maderna and Luciano Berio.

Our five student saxophone quartets were active with concerts and presentations throughout northwest Ohio. We enjoyed various "saxophone" social gatherings, including the annual Sampen Christmas party (with carols provided by the Mad Clown Quartet). And finally, with the graduation of Bryan Polacek this summer (after an "impressive" number of years in undergraduate coursework), we anticipate a great loss of the frequent "Polacek parties" which always featured seasonal sports activities (e.g., whiffle ball or frisbie football), great cooking and musical entertainment from his fabulous collection of compact discs.


